I began my sewing career as a freshman in high school. In Home Ec. Class in Shore Regional H.S. in New Jersey. I moved through her classes and made it to the tailoring class by my senior year.

Over the years, I have held numerous board positions on Music Boosters, HOA boards, Professional Surveyors of Ohio, and was a member of our township zoning board. My surveying background has given me the love of reading legal descriptions (quilting instructions) and puzzle solving (block construction) and problem solving (seam ripper) LOL.

I have made quilts for just about every member of my family, which is large, I'm from a family of 8 children. This includes gifts to numerous nieces and nephews, and their children. **Party Favors Class
With Jennifer McClanahan**

Workshop Class Supply List – Party Favors

½ day class – In this class the goal is to get at least 4 blocks done so that we can play with layouts which is what makes the pattern a “party”. But don’t worry if we get less done that works too and if we get more done that’s even better!

In order to speed up the process if you come to class with at the least the following below cut out it will save us sometime. But I am not the mean quilt police so if you come with none cut that’s okay too, precutting is only a suggestion.

Supplies needed: (based on a throw size quilt)

Party Favors pattern – will be provided by the teacher.

- 13 Assorted Fat quarters – 6 will be used as the larger blocks, 7 as accents and smaller cuts. smaller prints work best for the larger block is $6\frac{1}{2}'' \times 6\frac{1}{2}''$
- $1\frac{1}{4}$ yard of a Dark print – does not have to be a solid but needs to Definity read as a dark print
- $1\frac{1}{2}$ yard of a light print – does not have to be a solid but needs to Definity read as a light print.
- Preferable a $10\frac{1}{2}''$ square ruler – your block will be $10\frac{1}{2}'' \times 10\frac{1}{2}''$ If you have other sizes, you prefer that’s fine you will be making the following cuts - $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 6\frac{1}{2}''$ and $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 8\frac{1}{2}''$ and $6\frac{1}{2}'' \times 6\frac{1}{2}''$.
- Rotary Cutter
- Thread to match your fabric for piecing.
- Iron and Ironing mat (will see what is provided)

Pre-cutting – if you chose.... I am only giving you the cutting instructions needed to make 4 blocks!

For 4 blocks you will need the following cuts:

- From the fat quarters:
 - (4) $6\frac{1}{2}'' \times 6\frac{1}{2}''$ for the larger blocks
 - (8) matching sets of $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 6\frac{1}{2}''$ and $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 8\frac{1}{2}''$
- Dark Print:
 - (8) $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 2\frac{1}{2}''$
 - (1) $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 6\frac{1}{2}''$
 - (1) $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 8\frac{1}{2}''$
- Light Print:
 - (24) $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 2\frac{1}{2}''$
 - (8) $2\frac{1}{2}'' \times 4\frac{1}{2}''$

Below are the fabric requirements and instructions for the afternoon class on February 19th, 2024.

“Pretty Petals” Table Runner 19 ½” X 43 ½”



Fabric Requirements:

3/4 YD of Background Fabric

1/4 YD of Colored Fabric for Petals

1/8 YD for Stems

1 /4 YD for Leaves

1 /8 Yd for Inner Border

1 /2 YD for Outer Boarder

1 /3 YD for Binding

1-1/2 YD for Backing

2” Thangles (Provided by instructor)

“Always From The Heart Quilt Designs”

12 Colorful Buttons

PRETTY PETALS TABLE RUNNER

CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS and CLASS SUPPLIES

“**Pretty Petals**” is made with 12 – 6” Blocks comprised of background fabric, colorful petal fabric and 2 different greens for leaves and for stems. 2” Thangles were used to make the leaves (**THANGLES WILL BE PROVIDED BY INSTRUCTOR**) but can be made traditionally as well. This pattern can easily be adjusted to fit any table simply by adding or removing blocks.
WOF: Width of Fabric HST: Half Square Triangles

CUTTING INSTRUCTIONS:

Leaf Units:

Cut 2 – 3 1/4” x WOF strips of lighter green leaf fabric

Cut 2 – 3 1/4” x WOF strips of background fabric

Stem Units:

Cut 1 – 7/8” x WOF strip of darker green stem fabric

Cut 2 – 2” x WOF strips of background fabric

Cut 2 – 2 1/2” x WOF strips of background, sub-cut into 24 – 2 1/2” x 2 1/2” squares

***Petals:** Use a single color fabric for flowers, or a variety of colors for flower

Cut 4 – 2 1/2” x 2 1/2” squares for of flower fabric (4 per flower / 48 total squares)

Cut 48 – 1 3/8” x 1 3/8” squares of background fabric

Inner Border:

Cut 3 – 1” x WOF strips of inner border fabric

Outer Border:

Cut 3 – 3 1/2” x WOF strips of outer border fabric

Binding:

Cut 5 – 2 1/4” x WOF strips of binding fabric

***Note:** Consider using different colors for each flower to give it a multi-color look!

Class Supplies:

Sewing machine with 1/4” foot with guide and open toe foot

Thread to match or coordinate with fabrics (I used light grey thread)

Seam Ripper Glass head pins Small Scissors Rotary Cutter and Mat

Suggested rulers: 6 1/2 x 12 1/2; 6 1/2 x 6 1/2; 2 1/2; x 2 1/2; or small size square

2 inches Finished Thangles (**Instructor will provide**) (ruler measurements are in inches)

Small iron with pressing mat if desired

Every March we do an annual Quilt themed month at the Museum. Every week we switch out QOV quilts in the hallways and have a ceremony on the Saturdays. But during the weekdays.

I try to have textile/quilt themed talks and featured quilters. I'm looking for some folks who might be interested in giving a talk or showing off quilts in a bed turning. It doesn't just have to be quilts, or showing them off. Over the years we've had some of the following to give you an idea:

We give out door prizes at each of these and the speakers get a free membership to the Museum for doing the program. I'm also open to suggestions of anyone to reach out to! I'd like to start scheduling speakers in January so that we can fill up as many days as possible."
